Our progress score on achieving source protection plan objectives this reporting period:

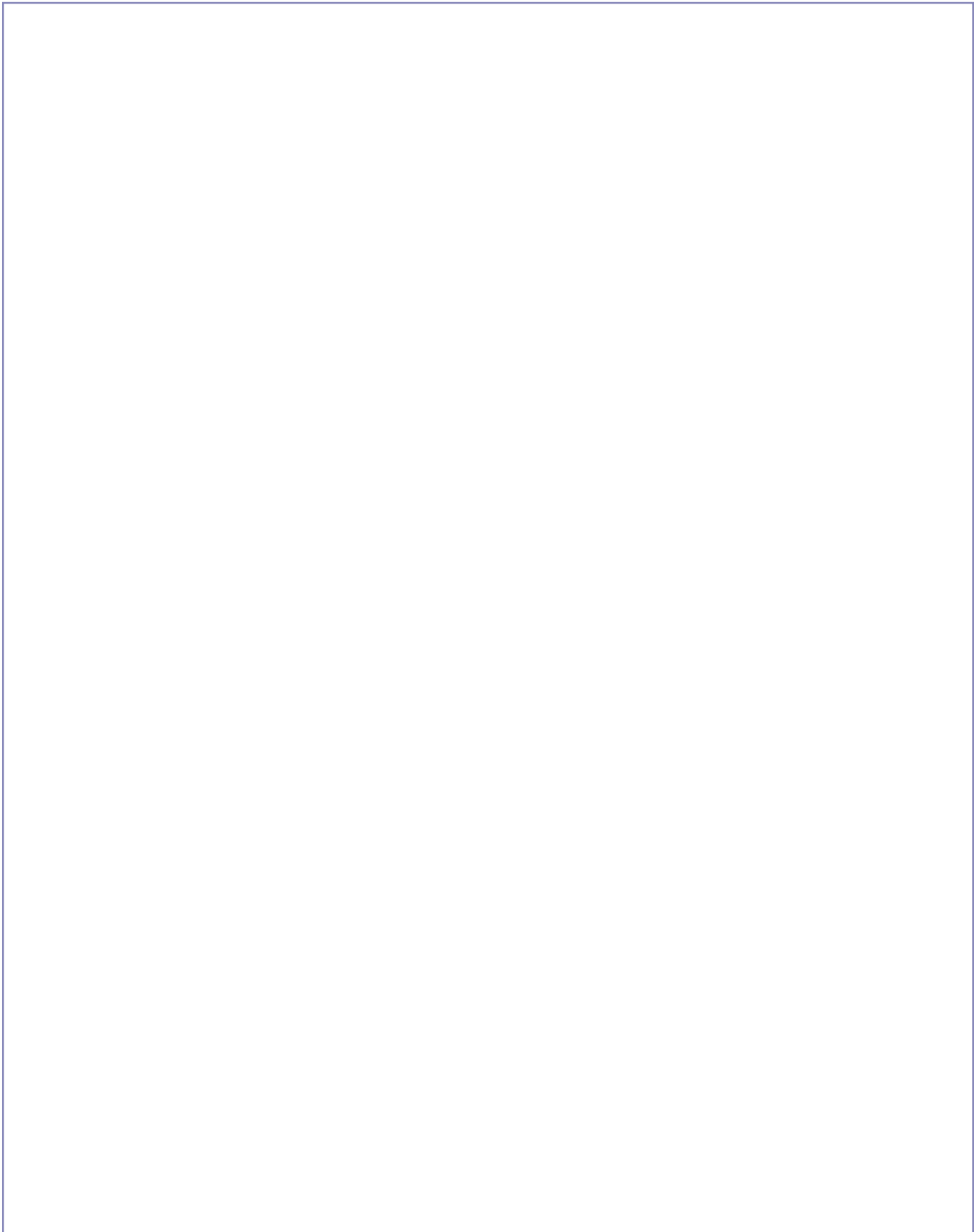
P : Progressing Well/On Target – The majority of the source protection plan policies have been implemented and/or are progressing.
